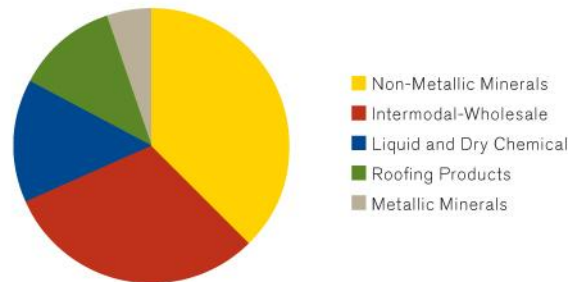

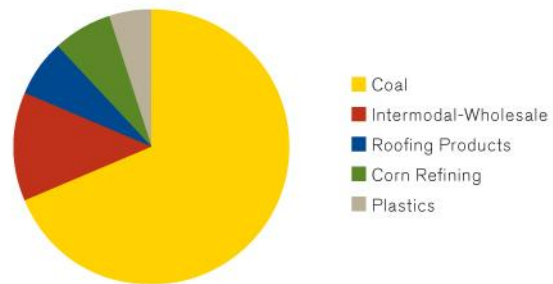

Union Pacific in Nevada

Two Union Pacific main lines cross Nevada. The first spans northern Nevada, linking central California with Salt Lake City. The second runs through the southern part of the state, including Las Vegas. That line connects Los Angeles-Long Beach with Salt Lake City and UP's transcontinental line to eastern destinations.

Major commodities handled by the railroad in Nevada include coal, chemicals, aggregates, lumber and consumer goods. In Reno and Sparks, the railroad participates in the growing warehousing industry made possible by the state's freeport laws. Union Pacific is an important link to markets for the industrial complex at nearby Henderson. Union Pacific also serves power

plants at Valmy in northern Nevada and Moapa in southern Nevada.

UP maintains crew change points and related facilities at Sparks, Elko, Winnemucca and Las Vegas. North Reno is the site of a switchyard and intermodal facility.

Union Pacific's Nevada heritage

The original transcontinental railroad crossed into Nevada in 1868, as the Central Pacific pushed east to meet the westward-building Union Pacific. The CP reached Reno on June 19, 1868 and Elko early the next year, finally meeting Union Pacific on May 10, 1869, at Promontory Summit, Utah.

After a series of acquisitions involving the Southern Pacific, Carson & Colorado Railroad and Virginia & Truckee Railroad, and legal action with Union Pacific, control of the CP was taken over by the Southern Pacific in 1924. Union Pacific acquired Southern Pacific in 1996.

Along the northern part of the state, the Western Pacific built a line that ran from Oakland, Calif., to Salt Lake City in 1909. The WP struggled all of its existence and was acquired by Union Pacific in 1982.

In 2009, Union Pacific provided more than \$177,000 to charitable organizations in Nevada communities. This amount includes funding from Union Pacific Foundation for The Principals' Partnership Program and the Community Grants Program.
